Delivering long term projects – measuring expectations Highways and all feedback that is traffic related is very important to the majority of our residents and also the most difficult to influence and change

We will publish information monthly from the Speed Indication devices to our website




Q1. Which village do you live in.





Q4. Open Green space is precious to our community. Do you want to see any improvements to these areas in the future?












Q8. Would you be supportive of removing vegetation to increase parking?




Q9. How much do you agree or disagree with the idea that the car park should be closed permanently.











Q17. The Parish Council should do all it can to reduce the volume and speed of traffic within both villages. To what extent do you agree with this statement.












Q27. As a general rule footpaths are marked by wooden footpath signs, way-marks or posts. Have you noticed any signposting that are either damaged or missing?






Q28 Identify where signposts are missing or damaged

- Opposite The Lodge on Northgate Lane the farm track towards Sicklinghall is not a defined path but well used for circular walks -to be investigated




Q29. The Parish Council should investigate spending money on improving existing footpaths. To what extent do you agree with this statement.






Q31. A bridleway is a footpath where there is an additional right to ride a horse or bicycle, with the path being 2 metres in width. Do you use bridleways in the villages?





Litter Picking


- Beck Wood planting and maintenance
